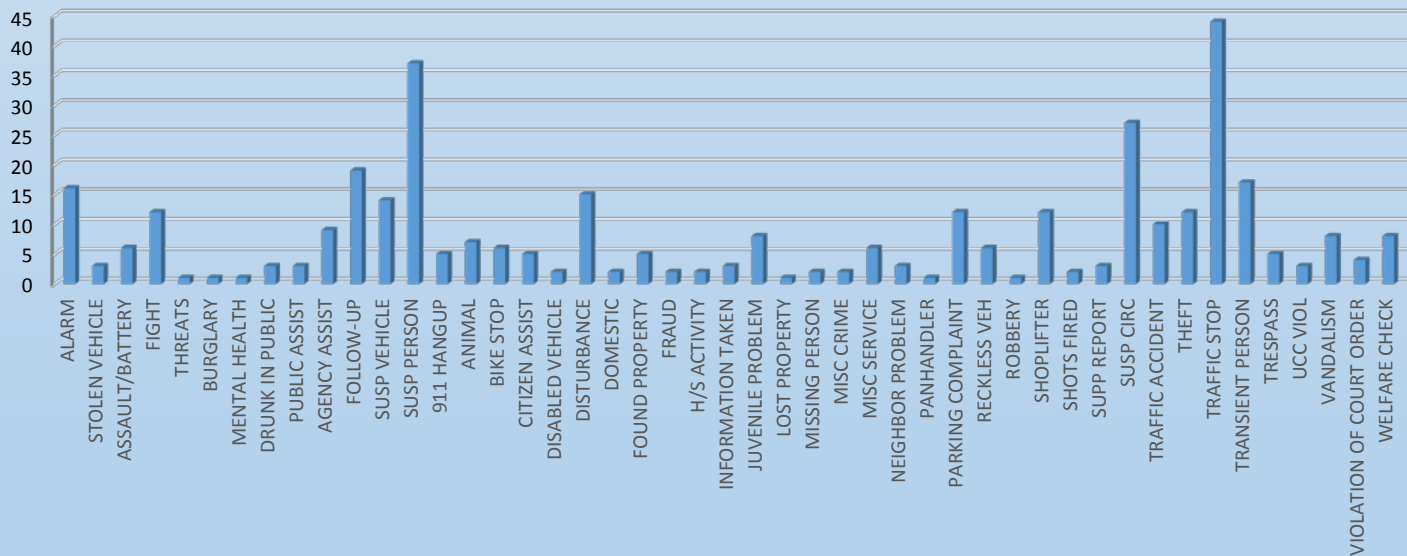

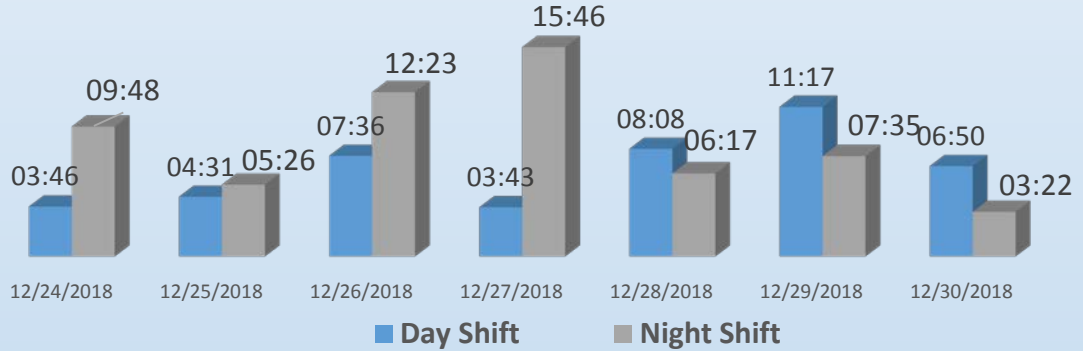

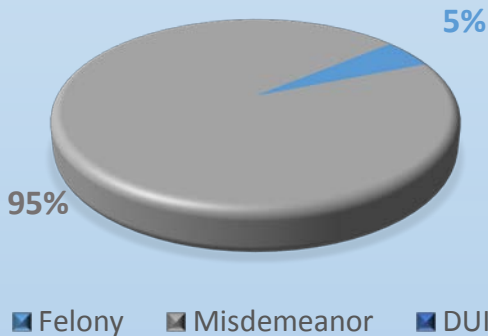
Daily Average Response Times (mm:ss)



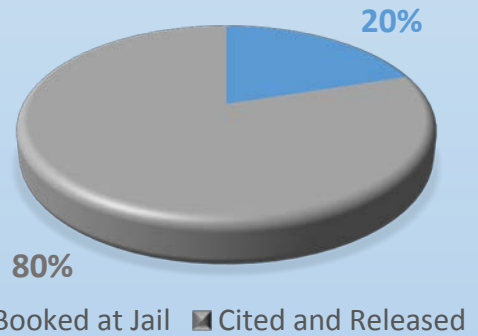
The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just under 3 minutes.

The average response time to all calls was just over 7 minutes.

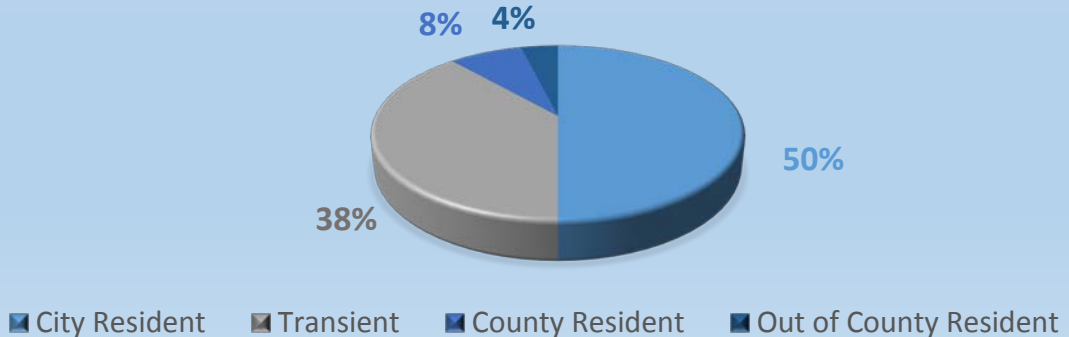
CRIME BREAKDOWN

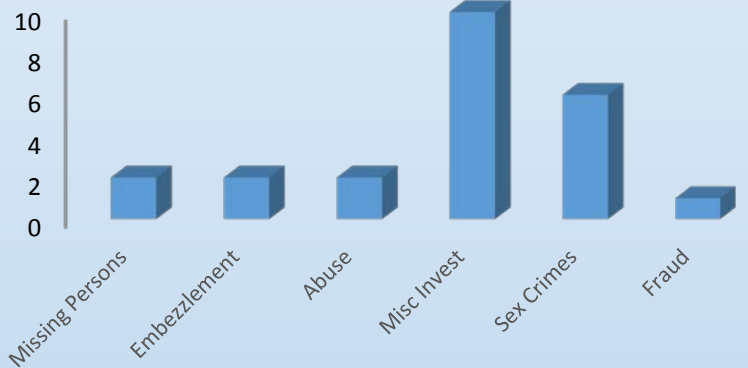

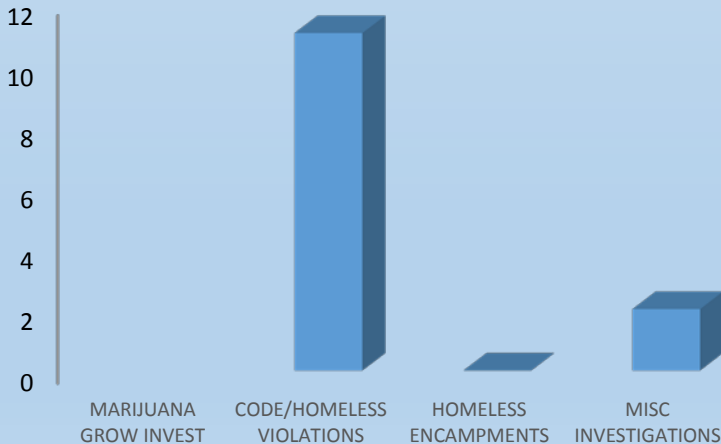

Professionalism: We value dedicated, highly trained personnel with a commitment to the standards of the law enforcement profession.

Community Service: We value the privilege to provide effective, efficient and equitable service. We respect the members of our community, the importance of a combined crime prevention alliance and the opportunity to provide a united policing effort.

We use these values in every aspect of our job. We train new officers to use these core values when they make critical decisions, and we use these values during the hiring and promotion processes. Our annual evaluation system is built around these core values.
